





ADVOCACY IS A YEAR- ROUND ACTIVITY



YOU CONTINUE TO PARTICIPATE IN THE PROCESS IN SPITE OF MULTIPLE PAUSES.

WHAT IS ADVOCACY

An action directed at changing the policies, positions, or programs of any type of institution.

- Wherever change needs to occur, advocacy has a role to play.
- Influencing policy decision-making and implementation by:
 - Educating
 - Reforming
 - Creating Accountability

ADVOCACY VS. LOBBYING

- ADVOCACY
 - PUBLIC SUPPORT FOR OR RECOMMENDATION OF A PARTICULAR CAUSE OR POLICY
 - NO LIMIT TO THE AMOUNT OF ADVOCACY A PERSON OR ORGANIZATION (SUCH AS A NONPROFIT) CAN DO

- LOBBYING
 - SEEK TO INFLUENCE A
 POLITICIAN OR PUBLIC
 OFFICIAL ON AN ISSUE
 - DIRECT LOBBYING
 - GRASSROOTS LOBBYING

EXAMPLES OF ADVOCACY VS LOBBYING

ADVOCACY

- TELLING AN ELECTED OFFICIAL HOW A POLICY AFFECTS CONSTITUENTS
- MEETING WITH AN ELECTED OFFICIAL TO EDUCATE/EXPLAIN HOW A PARTICULAR PROBLEM/ISSUE IS AFFECTING A PARTICULAR GROUP OR ORGANIZATION, ETC.

LOBBYING

- ASKING A LEGISLATOR TO VOTE FOR OR AGAINST, OR TO AMEND OR INTRODUCE, PARTICULAR LEGISLATION
- CREATING AN ONLINE PETITION ASKING THE PUBLIC TO CONTACT THEIR LEGISLATORS TO SUPPORT OR OPPOSE A PARTICULAR LEGISLATION

STATE LEADERS

GOVERNOR:

- FOUR YEAR TERM.
- THE GOVERNOR APPOINTS AGENCY AND DEPARTMENT HEADS, JUDGES, COUNTY SUPERVISORS FILLING PARTIAL TERMS, AND HUNDREDS OF POSITIONS ON BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS.





2026 GOVERNOR'S RACE





- First woman elected Lt. Governor in CA
- CA Representative for International Affairs and Trade
- President Barack Obama's Ambassador to the Republic of Hungary
- Campion for international trade, women's rights, higher education, and climate change.



State Senator Toni Atkins

- Senate Pro Tem
- Speaker of the Assembly
- San Diego City Council
- Campion for affordable housing, healthcare access, veterans, LGTBQ and women's rights, and the environment.



California State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Thurmond

- State Assembly
- Richmond City Council
- School Board Member
- Champion for education, mental health, literacy, and school meals.



Former State Controller

- State Board of Equalization
- Governor Gray Davis Budget Director
- Champion for economic opportunities, fighting discrimination, environmental causes and affordable health care.

STATE LEADERS

- 40 Senators and 80 Assemblymembers
- Senators serve four-year terms.
- Assemblymembers serve two-year terms.
- Members are able to serve up to 12 years in state legislature in total





CALENDAR

- APRIL 26: LAST DAY FOR POLICY COMMITTEES TO HEAR FISCAL BILLS
- MAY 3: LAST FOR POLICY COMMITTEES TO HEAR NONFISCAL BILLS
- MID MAY: GOVERNOR'S BUDGET REVISE TO LEGISLATURE 2A
- MAY 17: LAST DAY FOR FISCAL COMMITTEES TO PASS BILLS TO THEIR FLOOR
- MAY 24: LAST DAY FOR EACH HOUSE TO PASS BILLS IN ORIGINATING HOUSE 29
 - JUNE 15: BUDGET BILL DEADLINE
 - JULY 3: LAST DAY FOR POLICY COMMITTEES
 - AUGUST 31: LAST DAY FOR EACH HOUSE TO PASS BILLS
 - SEPTEMBER 30: GOVERNOR DEADLINE TO SIGN OR VETO BILLS

- WHO SHOULD USE THIS SITE? ANYONE WISHING TO SUBMIT A POSITION ON A CALIFORNIA LEGISLATIVE BILL CAN USE THIS SITE. PLEASE NOTE WE HAVE THREE CATEGORIES OF REGISTRANTS:
- REGISTERED LOBBYISTS WITH THE SECRETARY OF STATE
- ORGANIZATIONS AN INDIVIDUAL AFFILIATED WITH AN ORGANIZATION
- INDIVIDUALS



WORKING WITH ELECTED OFFICIALS

- LOBBYING IS ALL ABOUT EDUCATION; YOU ARE SIMPLY EDUCATING THEM ABOUT THE ISSUE.
- PROVIDE THE TOOLS AND RESOURCES NEEDED (FACTSHEETS, ISSUE BRIEF).
- SOMETIMES LESS IS MORE STICK TO THE FACTS.
- SHARE YOUR STORY.
- KNOW WHAT MOTIVATES THE DECISION MAKERS.
- UNDERSTAND THE IMPORTANCE OF THEIR STAFF AND STAY IN TOUCH.








Have a role model


You changed the law?





What, like it's hard?

Swing big - you can do big things!



We saved the Affordable Care Act!

(again, and again, and again)

National policy is really hard - Pick your battles and be ready for a fight.

California policy is easy(ish) – Pick a battle and be ready to win.

Have big goals... then get specific



Big picture goal:

I want disabled, medically fragile children to be able get the care they need to live at home with their families.

The little things I have to care about to make that happen:

- Home nursing
- Pediatric Day Health Care
- Waiver programs
- IEPs and 504s for kids who need nursing care at school.
- IHSS paramedical services
- Access to medical supplies at home

Support other people's priorities – disability rights is a big tent! But specialize in one thing.

Be singlemindedly obsessed with a niche program and become an expert in it.



I care about the Home and Community Based Alternatives waiver, a federal 1915(c) Medicaid program that authorizes additional services so that medically fragile, technology dependent children and adults can access private duty nursing at home

See? You fell asleep because I got bogged down in the details.

Know the details!

But also be able to tell the story.

Kids need care, and this program provides it.

Secret weapon – ask your legislator for casework

Sometimes you don't have to fix everything for everybody -

If a state agency is a problem, your legislator's local office has people who help constituents (that's you!) fix problems with state programs.

Legislators WANT to fix things... when they help you fix a little problem, they're probably already scheming ways to fix the bigger problem.

Grow up

Make friends with adults in the disability community.

Learn about the programs that are going to exist for your child when they grow up.

Disabled children grow up to be disabled adults – advocate for policies that help disabled PEOPLE not just disabled KIDS.

Every child deserves a champion - an adult who will never give up on them. Who understands the power of connection, and insists that they become the best that they can possibly be.



EMPOWERING WOMEN OF COLOR

Black children on average receive a diagnosis of autism at age 5.5 years. Other children are diagnosed on average at the age of 18 months - an alarming disparity! This difference often leads to delayed or no treatment.

THE INSIDE LOOK AT POLICY

How Policy is Made

- Legislation (way to change current law)
 - Problem with current law
 - Need for law
 - Issues in the district
 - Lobbyist (clients experience issue in law or need law)
 - Organizations/Advocates
 - Personal Experiences (members, constituents)

You are the most important advocate for your child

Your experiences make the most impact

Family engagement = outcomes

(Examples: Dyslexia Screening, Cord Blood and Special Education Legislation)

- Do not reinvent the wheel
 - Look to other similar advocacy groups join a coalition with same mission
 - Local, state and/or national
- PERSISTANCE
 - ■Don't give up some of our most impactful laws took years to pass. (American with Disabilities Act, American Care Act, Laura's Law)

- □ STRATEGY
- Talk to Members that *represent you* (one Senator and one Assemblymember)
- Reach out to Members who are on the committee(s) of your policy.
- Reach out to the Committee Consultants
- If the staffer is unable to help ask for their advice.

- Make Contact
 - Write letters
 - Make Calls
 - Use connections
 - Get local and state leaders involved

- ☐ Set up a meeting
 - Bring at least one child or young adult and one parent to share their personal story
 - Bring a provider who can talk about the need
 - Be prepared to educate
 - Have real numbers & statistics of the situation in your state & community

- □ Convince them how <u>BIG</u> the need is
 - Visual
 - Personal stories/hardships
 - Education materials
 - Invite them to the Medical Clinic/Educational Program

- Show how government support will save money in the long run
 - Screening & Education = Prevention
 - Testing = Healthier Patients
 - Good Health Care = Able Citizens and quality of life

- Always ask for a follow-up meeting
 - Get their commitment
 - Keeps the line of communication open
 - Gives you the chance to provide additional information / statistics
 - Shows <u>your</u> commitment
 - PERSISTANCE!
